

## Job Growth Among the Slowest of Any Administration in over 70 Years



## Private Sector Job Growth Among the Worst of Any Administration in over 70 Years


Change in Private Nonfarm Employment

## Nonfarm Payroll Employment



Civilian Unemployment Rate



Civilian Unemployment




## Over 80 Percent More Long-Term Unemployment

## Productivity and Real Compensation per Hour for Nonfarm Businesses





Federal Budget Surpluses and Deficits and CBO Baseline Projections FY 2000 - 2007



Bush Administration Projections of Public Debt in 2008



Average Amount of 2001-2006 Tax Cuts by Household Income, 2007



Real Median Household Income





## Real Median Household Income Down \$962



## Real Household Income Has Declined for All Except the Richest since 2000




Note: Each quintile contains 20 percent of households ranked by household income.

## One of Four Administrations with an Average Annual Rise in the Poverty Rate



Number of People in Poverty


