

ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: IOWA

Includes Bureau of Labor Statistics jobs and unemployment data through July 2014

JOBS

- In July, private-sector employment in Iowa grew by 1,400 jobs. Over the past year, the Iowa private sector has added 15,200 jobs. This compares with an increase of 20,700 jobs over the 12 months ending in July 2013.
- lowa private-sector employers have added 78,900 jobs (an increase of 6.5 percent) since February 2010, the national low point for 0 private-sector employment.
- In Iowa, the following sectors have posted the largest job gains since February 2010: manufacturing (16,100 jobs), professional and Ο business services (14,900 jobs) and trade, transportation and utilities (14,300 jobs).
- The lowa sectors with the greatest job gains in percentage terms since February 2010 are: construction (16.0 percent), mining and 0 logging (14.3 percent) and professional and business services (12.5 percent).



UNEMPLOYMENT

- The unemployment rate in Iowa was 4.5 percent in July 2014, up 0.1 percentage point from June. The rate is down 0.3 percentage 0 point from one year earlier and is below its recent peak of 6.4 percent in August 2010.
- 76,900 lowa residents were unemployed during July 2014, down from a recent high of 106,600 in October 2009. There are still 11,300 0 more people unemployed in Iowa than when the recession began.
- In lowa, initial claims for unemployment insurance benefits totaled 11,126 during June, down 12.0 percent from the previous month. Ο Total initial claims over the past 12 months are down 8.0 percent from their level over the 12 months before that.

EXPORTS

- 0 In Iowa, exports totaled \$1.4 billion in June and \$14.8 billion over the past year, up 6.8 percent from the 12 months ending in June 2013 (inflation-adjusted dollars).
- lowa exports over the past 12 months are up 36.8 percent from their level in the same 12-month period four years earlier (inflationadjusted dollars).

Housing

- Home prices in Iowa increased by 1.7 percent from the first quarter of 2013 to the first quarter of 2014 (the most recent quarter for which data are available). They are up 4.7 percent since their recent low in the second quarter of 2011 and are now 2.2 percent above their pre-housing-crash peak.
- Housing starts in Iowa totaled 13,460 units (seasonally adjusted annual rate) in June 2014, an increase of 48.1 percent from May. 0
- Within the Midwest census region, which includes lowa, sales of new single-family homes totaled 67,000 units in June 2014, a Ο decrease of 8.2 percent from May. Sales of existing single-family homes increased by 5.7 percent to 1,120,000 units (at seasonally adjusted annual rates) from May to June 2014.



How Does Iowa Compare to Other States?

Workers across the country were hit hard during the recent recession. Since then, employment in some states has returned to pre-recession levels, while employment in other states remains below pre-recession levels. The chart below allows for a comparison of Iowa to other states using two metrics.

The unemployment rate (measured along the horizontal axis) serves as a gauge of current labor-market conditions in lowa, while net job gains since the recession began (current nonfarm jobs as a share of jobs prior to the recession) measures progress toward labor-market recovery (vertical axis).

States falling in the upper left quadrant have net job gains since the start of the recession and unemployment rates lower than the national unemployment rate. States falling in the lower right quadrant have higher unemployment rates than the United States overall and are still experiencing net job losses relative to pre-recession levels.



Note: The figure above excludes North Dakota, which has a current unemployment rate of 2.8% and net job gains totaling 28.5% since the start of the recession.
