



# Maryland Economic Update

June 19, 2015

## Summary


Nonfarm payroll employment in Maryland increased by 13,500 jobs and the unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.3 percent in May according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

## Maryland Unemployment Rate

During May, the unemployment rate in Maryland was unchanged at 5.3 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed rose by 5 in May to 165,939, while the labor force grew by 12,934 to 3,145,528. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 24 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than Maryland. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in Maryland stood at 5.8 percent.

The 10 year peak for the unemployment rate in Maryland was 7.8 percent in February 2010. The series high for the unemployment rate in Maryland occurred in March 1982 when the unemployment rate reached 8.5 percent. The 10 year low for the unemployment rate in Maryland was 3.4 percent in January 2008. The series low for the unemployment rate in Maryland occurred in December 1999 when the unemployment rate reached 3.3 percent. BLS began publishing the state unemployment rate series in 1976.

The national unemployment rate was inched up to 5.5 percent in May. May's unemployment rate was 0.8 percentage point lower than a year earlier when the rate stood at 6.3 percent. The ten year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The ten year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



## Maryland Payroll Employment



Maryland nonfarm payrolls increased by 13,500 jobs, or 0.51 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during May. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls increased by 16,300. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in Maryland increased by 46,800, or 1.79 percent. Maryland nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 10 of the past 12 months.

Nationally nonfarm payrolls increased by 280,000 jobs in May, or 0.20 percent. Over the 12 month period ending in May 2015, nonfarm payrolls grew by 3,058,000 jobs, or 2.21 percent. Maryland ranks 20th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, Maryland private sector payrolls increased by 10,800, or 0.50 percent. Private sector payrolls increased by 14,900 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private sector payrolls in Maryland increased by 40,400, or 1.91 percent. Maryland private sector payroll employment has increased in 9 of the past 12 months.


Nationally, private sector payroll jobs increased by 262,000 in May, or 0.22 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,958,000 private sector payroll jobs, an increase of 2.53 percent. Maryland ranks 24th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, total government payroll employment in Maryland increased by 2,700, or 0.53 percent. Federal government payroll employment increased by 300, or 0.21 percent. State government payroll employment increased by 2,300, or 2.08 percent, while local government payroll employment increased by 100, or 0.04 percent.



Over the past year, total government payroll employment increased by 6,400, or 1.27 percent. State government payroll employment increased by 1,100, or 0.99 percent. Local government payroll employment increased by 3,800, or 1.53 percent.


The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during May were Logging, Mining & Construction (+4,500) and Leisure & Hospitality (+4,400). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Professional & Business Services (-800) and Information (-500).



The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Educational & Health Services (+12,200) and Leisure & Hospitality (+11,400). The poorest performing sectors for the year were Manufacturing (-2,000) and Information (-700).

#### Other Maryland Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in Maryland rose to 66.8 percent in May from 66.5 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 14 have a higher labor force participation rate than Maryland. The labor force participation rate in Maryland is unchanged from a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.



The 10 year high for the labor force participation rate in Maryland was 69.2 percent in May 2009. The series high for the labor force participation rate in Maryland occurred in December 1989 when the labor force participation rate hit 71.4 percent. The 10 year low for the labor force participation rate was 66.1 percent in December 2014. The series low for the labor force participation rate occurred in June 1976 when the labor force participation rate hit 64.3 percent.

The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 62.9 percent in May. That rate is 0.1 percentage point higher than a year earlier.

The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the Maryland civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, rose to 63.2 percent in May from 63.0 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 15 have higher employment-to-population ratios than Maryland. The employment-to-population ratio in Maryland is 0.8 percentage point higher than a year earlier.

The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio in Maryland was 66.4 percent in January 2007. The series high for the employment-to-population ratio in Maryland occurred in December 1989 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 68.7 percent. The 10 year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 62.4 percent in December 2014. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in September 1976 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 60.0 percent.

The national employment-to-population ratio ticked up to 59.4 percent in May. At 59.4 percent, the national employment-to-population ratio has finally risen back to the level it was at when the recession ended in June 2009. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 percent in May 2000. The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for May is scheduled for release on Tuesday, July 21. The national employment situation report for June is scheduled for release on Thursday, July 2. The national employment report is being released on Thursday instead of Friday due to the Independence Day holiday.
