



Georgia Economic Update

August 19, 2016

Summary


Nonfarm payroll employment in Georgia increased by 2,300 jobs and the unemployment rate fell to 5.0 percent in July according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Georgia Unemployment Rate

During July, the unemployment rate in Georgia declined by 0.1 percentage point to 5.0 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed fell by 6,209 in July to 242,893, while the labor force grew by 13,033 to 4,882,256. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 30 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than Georgia. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in Georgia stood at 5.7 percent.

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The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 4.9 percent in July. July's unemployment rate was 0.4 percentage point lower than a year earlier. The 10-year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The 10-year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



Georgia Payroll Employment

Georgia nonfarm payrolls increased by 2,300 jobs, or 0.05 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during July. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls increased by 7,900. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in Georgia increased by 116,200, or 2.72 percent. Georgia nonfarm payroll employment has increased in each of the past 12 months.



Nationally, nonfarm payrolls increased by 255,000 jobs in July, or 0.18 percent. Over the 12-month period ending July 2016, nonfarm payrolls grew by 2,447,000 jobs, or 1.72 percent. Georgia ranks 7th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During July, Georgia private-sector payrolls increased by 4,200, or 0.11 percent. Private-sector payrolls increased by 6,300 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private-sector payrolls in Georgia increased by 111,500, or 3.11 percent. Georgia private-sector payroll employment has increased in 11 of the past 12 months.

Nationally private-sector payroll jobs increased by 217,000 jobs in July, or 0.18 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,293,000 jobs in the private sector, an increase of 1.91 percent. Georgia ranks 7th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private-sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.


During July, total government payroll employment in Georgia declined by 1,900, or 0.28 percent. Federal government payroll employment increased by 400, or 0.40 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 400, or 0.23 percent, while local government payroll employment declined by 1,900, or 0.46 percent.

Over the past year, total government payroll employment increased by 4,700, or 0.69 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 1,200, or 0.70 percent. Local government payroll employment increased by 4,900, or 1.20 percent.



The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during July were Educational & Health Services (+4,600), Manufacturing (+2,500), and Trade, Transportation & Utilities (+2,500). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Total Government (-1,900) and Professional & Business Services (-1,300).


The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Professional & Business Services (+32,200) and Trade, Transportation & Utilities (+24,800). The poorest performing sectors during the last twelve months were Information (-5,900) and Mining & Logging (-600).



Other Georgia Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in Georgia rose to 61.9 percent in July from 61.8 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 35 have a higher labor force participation rate than Georgia. The labor force participation rate in Georgia is 0.9 percentage point higher than a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

The 10-year high for the labor force participation rate in Georgia was 68.8 percent in August 2008. The series high for the labor force participation rate in Georgia occurred in December 1998 when the labor force participation rate hit 69.7 percent. The 10-year low for the labor force participation rate was 61.0 percent in October 2015. This also represents the series low for the labor force participation rate in Georgia.



The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 62.8 percent in July, but remains near its 38-year low of 62.4 percent.

The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the Georgia civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, rose to 58.8 percent in July from 58.6 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of

Columbia, 33 have higher employment-to-population ratios than Georgia. The employment-to-population ratio in Georgia is 1.3 percentage points higher than a year earlier.

The 10-year high for the employment-to-population ratio in Georgia was 65.2 percent in February 2007. The series high for the employment-to-population ratio in Georgia occurred in April 2000 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 67.1 percent. The 10-year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 56.8 percent in March 2010. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in April 2010 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 56.8 percent.

The national employment-to-population ratio rose by 0.1 percentage point to 59.7 percent in July. That rate was 0.4 percentage point higher than a year earlier. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 in April 2000. The 10-year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population ratio posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for August is scheduled for release on September 20, 2016. The national employment situation report for August will be released on Friday, September 2, 2016.
