




## ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: RHODE ISLAND

*\*\*Includes Bureau of Labor Statistics jobs and unemployment data through March 2014\*\**

### JOBS

- In March, private-sector employment in Rhode Island fell by 700 jobs. Over the past year, the Rhode Island private sector has added 6,700 jobs. This compares with an increase of 4,100 jobs over the 12 months ending in March 2013.
- Rhode Island private-sector employers have added 21,600 jobs (an increase of 5.5 percent) since February 2010, the national low point for private-sector employment.
- In Rhode Island, the following sectors have posted the largest job gains since February 2010: professional and business services (7,800 jobs), leisure and hospitality (6,300 jobs) and education and health services (4,200 jobs).
- The Rhode Island sectors with the greatest job gains in percentage terms since February 2010 are: professional and business services (14.9 percent), leisure and hospitality (12.9 percent) and other services (5.0 percent).



### UNEMPLOYMENT

- The unemployment rate in Rhode Island was 8.7 percent in March 2014, down 0.3 percentage point from February. The rate is down 0.8 percentage point from one year earlier and is below its recent peak of 11.9 percent in March 2010.
- 48,500 Rhode Island residents were unemployed during March 2014, down from a recent high of 68,100 in February 2010. There are still 14,200 more people unemployed in Rhode Island than when the recession began.
- In Rhode Island, initial claims for unemployment insurance benefits totaled 6,086 during March, down 22.2 percent from the previous month. Total initial claims over the past 12 months are down 13.3 percent from their level over the 12 months before that.

### EXPORTS

- In Rhode Island, exports totaled \$153 million in February and \$2.1 billion over the past year, down 9.5 percent from the 12 months ending in February 2013 (inflation-adjusted dollars).
- Rhode Island exports over the past 12 months are up 18.6 percent from their level in the same 12-month period four years earlier (inflation-adjusted dollars).

### HOUSING

- Home prices in Rhode Island decreased by 0.7 percent from the fourth quarter of 2012 to the fourth quarter of 2013 (the most recent quarter for which data are available). They are up 0.5 percent since their recent low in the second quarter of 2012 but remain 26.7 percent below their pre-housing-crash peak.
- Housing starts in Rhode Island totaled 330 units (seasonally adjusted annual rate) in February 2014, a decrease of 66.0 percent from January.
- Within the Northeast census region, which includes Rhode Island, sales of new single-family homes totaled 23,000 units in February 2014, a decrease of 32.4 percent from January. Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 13.5 percent to 450,000 units (at seasonally adjusted annual rates) from January to February 2014.



## How Does Rhode Island Compare to Other States?

Workers across the country were hit hard during the recent recession. Since then, employment in some states has returned to pre-recession levels, while employment in other states remains below pre-recession levels. The chart below allows for a comparison of Rhode Island to other states using two metrics.

The unemployment rate (measured along the horizontal axis) serves as a gauge of current labor-market conditions in Rhode Island, while net job gains since the recession began (current nonfarm jobs as a share of jobs prior to the recession) measures progress toward labor-market recovery (vertical axis).

States falling in the upper left quadrant have net job gains since the start of the recession and unemployment rates lower than the national unemployment rate. States falling in the lower right quadrant have higher unemployment rates than the United States overall and are still experiencing net job losses relative to pre-recession levels.



Note: The figure above excludes North Dakota, which has a current unemployment rate of 2.6% and net job gains totaling 26.9% since the start of the recession.
