



Delaware Economic Update

May 27, 2015

Summary


Nonfarm payroll employment in Delaware declined by 1,100 jobs and the unemployment rate fell to 4.5 percent in April according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Delaware Unemployment Rate

During April, the unemployment rate in Delaware declined by 0.1 percentage point to 4.5 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed fell by 269 in April to 20,690, while the labor force grew by 1,806 to 459,951. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 17 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than Delaware. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in Delaware stood at 5.9 percent.

The 10 year peak for the unemployment rate in Delaware was 8.7 percent in February 2010. The series high for the unemployment rate in Delaware occurred in December 1976 when the unemployment rate reached 9.8 percent. The 10 year low for the unemployment rate in Delaware was 3.4 percent in September 2007. The series low for the unemployment rate in Delaware occurred in June 1988 when the unemployment rate reached 3.0 percent. BLS began publishing the state unemployment rate series in 1976.

The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.4 percent in April. April's unemployment rate was 0.8 percentage point lower than a year earlier when the rate stood at 6.2 percent. The ten year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The ten year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



Delaware Payroll Employment



Delaware nonfarm payrolls declined by 1,100 jobs, or 0.25 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during April. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls increased by 1,400. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in Delaware increased by 7,000, or 1.61 percent. Delaware nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 8 of the past 12 months.

Nationally nonfarm payrolls increased by 223,000 jobs in April, or 0.16 percent. Over the 12 month period ending in April 2015, nonfarm payrolls grew by 2,982,000 jobs, or 2.15 percent. Delaware ranks 26th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During April, Delaware private sector payrolls declined by 1,100, or 0.29 percent. Private sector payrolls increased by 1,400 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private sector payrolls in Delaware increased by 6,700, or 1.80 percent. Delaware private sector payroll employment has increased in 8 of the past 12 months.

Nationally, private sector payroll jobs increased by 213,000 in April, or 0.18 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,918,000 private sector payroll jobs, an increase of 2.50 percent. Delaware ranks 25th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.


During April, total government payroll employment in Delaware was unchanged. Federal government payroll employment was unchanged. State government payroll employment declined by 100, or 0.31 percent, while local government payroll employment declined by 100, or 0.37 percent.



Over the past year, total government payroll employment increased by 300, or 0.46 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 300, or 0.92 percent. Local government payroll employment increased by 500, or 1.89 percent.

The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during April were Trade, Transportation & Utilities (+800) and Leisure & Hospitality (+300). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Professional & Business Services (-1,100) and Financial Activities (-500).

The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Professional & Business Services (+2,100) and Leisure & Hospitality (+1,700). The poorest performing sectors for the year were Other Services (-200) and Manufacturing (unchanged).




Other Delaware Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in Delaware rose to 61.8 percent in April from 61.6 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 35 have a higher labor force participation rate than Delaware. The labor force participation rate in Delaware is unchanged from a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

The 10 year high for the labor force participation rate in Delaware was 67.6 percent in December 2005. The series high for the labor force participation rate in Delaware occurred in January 1990 when the labor force participation rate hit 71.0 percent. The 10 year low for the labor force participation rate was 60.6 percent in December 2013. This also represents the series low for the labor force participation rate in Delaware.

The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 62.8 percent in April. That rate is the same as a year earlier.



The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the Delaware civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, rose to 59.0 percent in April from 58.8 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 32 have higher employment-to-population ratios than Delaware. The employment-to-population ratio in Delaware is 1.6 percentage points higher than a year earlier.

The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio in Delaware was 64.9 percent in February 2006. The series high for the employment-to-population ratio in Delaware occurred in January 1990 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 68.3 percent. The 10 year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 56.3 percent in April 2010. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in May 2010 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 56.3 percent.

The national employment-to-population ratio was unchanged at 59.3 percent in April. At 59.3 percent, the national employment-to-population ratio is still below the level of 59.4 percent when the recession ended in June 2009. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 percent in April 2000. The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for May is scheduled for release on Friday, June 19. The national employment situation report for April is scheduled for release on Friday, June 5.
