



ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: NEW MEXICO

Includes Bureau of Labor Statistics jobs and unemployment data through January 2014

JOBS

- In January, private-sector employment in New Mexico fell by 100 jobs. Over the past year, private-sector employment in New Mexico was unchanged. This compares with an increase of 11,300 jobs over the 12 months ending in January 2013.
- New Mexico private-sector employers have added 15,000 jobs (an increase of 2.5 percent) since February 2010, the national low point for private-sector employment.
- In New Mexico, the following sectors have posted the largest job gains since February 2010: mining and logging (9,500 jobs), education and health services (4,800 jobs) and trade, transportation and utilities (4,600 jobs).
- The New Mexico sectors with the greatest job gains in percentage terms since February 2010 are: mining and logging (53.4 percent), leisure and hospitality (4.9 percent) and education and health services (4.0 percent).



UNEMPLOYMENT

- The unemployment rate in New Mexico was 6.6 percent in January 2014, holding constant from December. The rate is down 0.3 percentage point from one year earlier and is below its recent peak of 8.0 percent in November 2010.
- 61,600 New Mexico residents were unemployed during January 2014, down from a recent high of 74,700 in August 2010. There are still 28,100 more people unemployed in New Mexico than when the recession began.
- In New Mexico, initial claims for unemployment insurance benefits totaled 6,131 during January, up 5.4 percent from the previous month. Total initial claims over the past 12 months are down 20.1 percent from their level over the 12 months before that.

EXPORTS

- In New Mexico, exports totaled \$298 million in January and \$2.8 billion over the past year, down 6.1 percent from the 12 months ending in January 2013 (inflation-adjusted dollars).
- New Mexico exports over the past 12 months are up 90.8 percent from their level in the same 12-month period four years earlier (inflation-adjusted dollars).

HOUSING

- Home prices in New Mexico increased by 1.8 percent from the fourth quarter of 2012 to the fourth quarter of 2013 (the most recent quarter for which data are available). They are up 2.7 percent since their recent low in the second quarter of 2012 but remain 13.3 percent below their pre-housing-crash peak.
- Housing starts in New Mexico totaled 7,740 units (seasonally adjusted annual rate) in January 2014, an increase of 98.0 percent from December.
- Within the West census region, which includes New Mexico, sales of new single-family homes totaled 111,000 units in January 2014, an increase of 11.0 percent from December 2013. Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 8.3 percent to 880,000 units (at seasonally adjusted annual rates) from December 2013 to January 2014.



How Does New Mexico Compare to Other States?

Workers across the country were hit hard during the recent recession. Since then, employment in some states has returned to pre-recession levels, while employment in other states remains below pre-recession levels. The chart below allows for a comparison of New Mexico to other states using two metrics.

The unemployment rate (measured along the horizontal axis) serves as a gauge of current labor-market conditions in New Mexico, while net job gains since the recession began (current nonfarm jobs as a share of jobs prior to the recession) measures progress toward labor-market recovery (vertical axis).

States falling in the upper left quadrant have net job gains since the start of the recession and unemployment rates lower than the national unemployment rate. States falling in the lower right quadrant have higher unemployment rates than the United States overall and are still experiencing net job losses relative to pre-recession levels.



Note: The figure above excludes North Dakota, which has a current unemployment rate of 2.6% and net job gains totaling 24.7% since the start of the recession.
