



Oregon Economic Update

June 19, 2015

Summary

Nonfarm payroll employment in Oregon declined by 1,400 jobs and the unemployment rate rose to 5.3 percent in May according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Oregon Unemployment Rate

During May, the unemployment rate in Oregon increased by 0.1 percentage point to 5.3 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed rose by 1,659 in May to 102,678, while the labor force fell by 7,248 to 1,937,990. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 24 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than Oregon. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in Oregon stood at 7.0 percent.

The 10 year peak for the unemployment rate in Oregon was 11.9 percent in May 2009. This also represents the series high for the unemployment rate in Oregon. The 10 year low for the unemployment rate in Oregon was 5.0 percent in May 2007. The series low for the unemployment rate in Oregon occurred in February 1995 when the unemployment rate reached 4.7 percent. BLS began publishing the state unemployment rate series in 1976.

The national unemployment rate was inched up to 5.5 percent in May. May's unemployment rate was 0.8 percentage point lower than a year earlier when the rate stood at 6.3 percent. The ten year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The ten year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



Oregon Payroll Employment



Oregon nonfarm payrolls declined by 1,400 jobs, or 0.08 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during May. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls increased by 6,000. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in Oregon increased by 53,400, or 3.12 percent. Oregon nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 11 of the past 12 months.

Nationally nonfarm payrolls increased by 280,000 jobs in May, or 0.20 percent. Over the 12 month period ending in May 2015, nonfarm payrolls grew by 3,058,000 jobs, or 2.21 percent. Oregon ranks 6th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, Oregon private sector payrolls declined by 1,100, or 0.07 percent. Private sector payrolls increased by 6,700 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private sector payrolls in Oregon increased by 48,000, or 3.38 percent. Oregon private sector payroll employment has increased in 11 of the past 12 months.

Nationally, private sector payroll jobs increased by 262,000 in May, or 0.22 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,958,000 private sector payroll jobs, an increase of 2.53 percent. Oregon ranks 7th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, total government payroll employment in Oregon declined by 300, or 0.10 percent. Federal government payroll employment increased by 200, or 0.72 percent. State government payroll employment increased by 200, or 0.23 percent, while local government payroll employment declined by 700, or 0.38 percent.



Over the past year, total government payroll employment increased by 5,400, or 1.85 percent. State government payroll employment increased by 2,800, or 3.36 percent. Local government payroll employment increased by 2,000, or 1.10 percent.

The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during May were Educational & Health Services (+700) and Construction (+600). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Trade, Transportation & Utilities (-1,300) and Manufacturing (-800).


The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Educational & Health Services (+12,100) and Professional & Business Services (+12,100). The poorest performing sectors for the year were Mining & Logging (-500) and Financial Activities (+100).

Other Oregon Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in Oregon declined to 60.5 percent in May from 60.8 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 39 have a higher labor force participation rate than Oregon. The labor force participation rate in Oregon is unchanged from a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

The 10 year high for the labor force participation rate in Oregon was 66.4 percent in March 2009. The series high for the labor force participation rate in Oregon occurred in May 2000 when the labor force participation rate hit 69.1 percent. The 10 year low for the labor force participation rate was 60.5 percent in May 2015. This also represents the series low for the labor force participation rate in Oregon.

The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 62.9 percent in May. That rate is 0.1 percentage point higher than a year earlier.



The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the Oregon civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, declined to 57.3 percent in May from 57.7 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 39 have higher employment-to-population ratios than Oregon. The employment-to-population ratio in Oregon is 0.5 percentage point higher than a year earlier.

The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio in Oregon was 62.5 percent in February 2007. The series high for the employment-to-population ratio in Oregon occurred in April 2000 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 65.6 percent. The 10 year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 56.2 percent in October 2013. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in March 1976 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 56.1 percent.

The national employment-to-population ratio ticked up to 59.4 percent in May. At 59.4 percent, the national employment-to-population ratio has finally risen back to the level it was at when the recession ended in June 2009. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 percent in May 2000. The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for May is scheduled for release on Tuesday, July 21. The national employment situation report for June is scheduled for release on Thursday, July 2. The national employment report is being released on Thursday instead of Friday due to the Independence Day holiday.
