

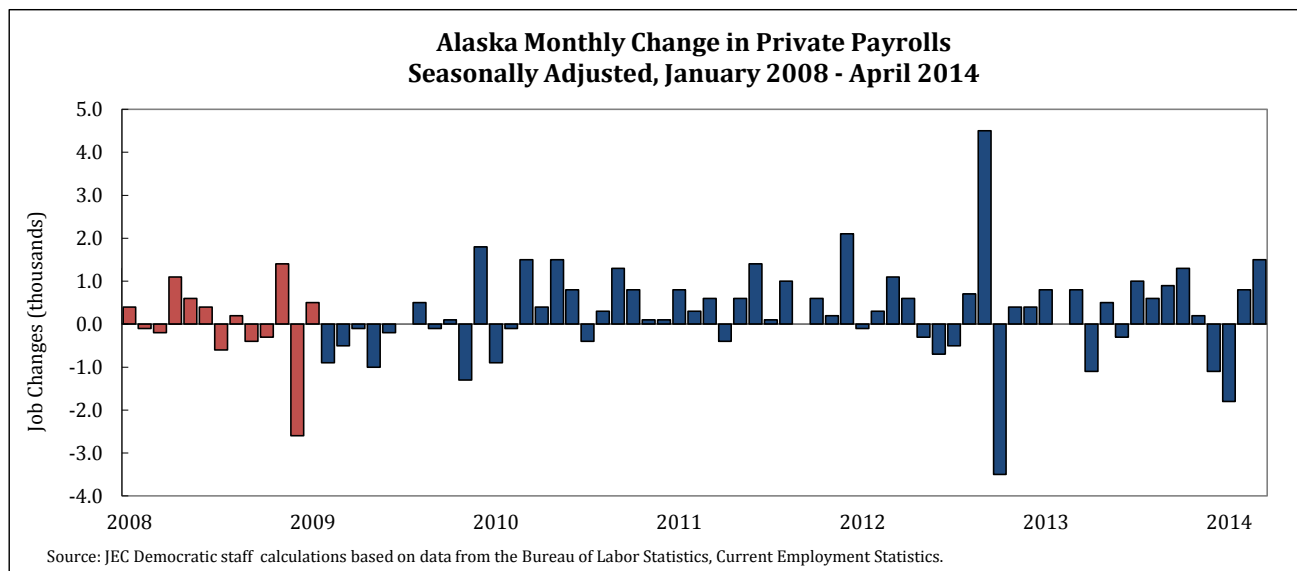


ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: ALASKA

Includes Bureau of Labor Statistics jobs and unemployment data through April 2014

JOBS

- In April, private-sector employment in Alaska grew by 1,500 jobs. Over the past year, the Alaska private sector has added 2,500 jobs. This compares with an increase of 3,200 jobs over the 12 months ending in April 2013.
- Alaska private-sector employers have added 20,600 jobs (an increase of 8.7 percent) since February 2010, the national low point for private-sector employment.
- In Alaska, the following sectors have posted the largest job gains since February 2010: education and health services (5,700 jobs), manufacturing (3,600 jobs) and mining and logging (3,400 jobs).
- The Alaska sectors with the greatest job gains in percentage terms since February 2010 are: manufacturing (28.3 percent), mining and logging (23.1 percent) and education and health services (13.8 percent).



UNEMPLOYMENT

- The unemployment rate in Alaska was 6.4 percent in April 2014, down 0.2 percentage point from March. The rate held constant from one year earlier and is below its recent peak of 8.2 percent in February 2010.
- 23,600 Alaska residents were unemployed during April 2014, down from a recent high of 29,400 in February 2010. There are still 1,700 more people unemployed in Alaska than when the recession began.
- In Alaska, initial claims for unemployment insurance benefits totaled 5,906 during March, down 7.6 percent from the previous month. Total initial claims over the past 12 months are down 1.9 percent from their level over the 12 months before that.

EXPORTS

- In Alaska, exports totaled \$533 million in March and \$4.8 billion over the past year, up 4.2 percent from the 12 months ending in March 2013 (inflation-adjusted dollars).
- Alaska exports over the past 12 months are up 25.7 percent from their level in the same 12-month period four years earlier (inflation-adjusted dollars).

HOUSING

- Home prices in Alaska increased by 3.3 percent from the fourth quarter of 2012 to the fourth quarter of 2013 (the most recent quarter for which data are available). They are up 6.9 percent since their recent low in the first quarter of 2010 and are now 3.9 percent above their pre-housing-crash peak.
- Housing starts in Alaska totaled 950 units (seasonally adjusted annual rate) in March 2014, an increase of 31.9 percent from February.
- Within the West census region, which includes Alaska, sales of new single-family homes totaled 80,000 units in March 2014, a decrease of 16.7 percent from February. Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 4.3 percent to 900,000 units (at seasonally adjusted annual rates) from February to March 2014.

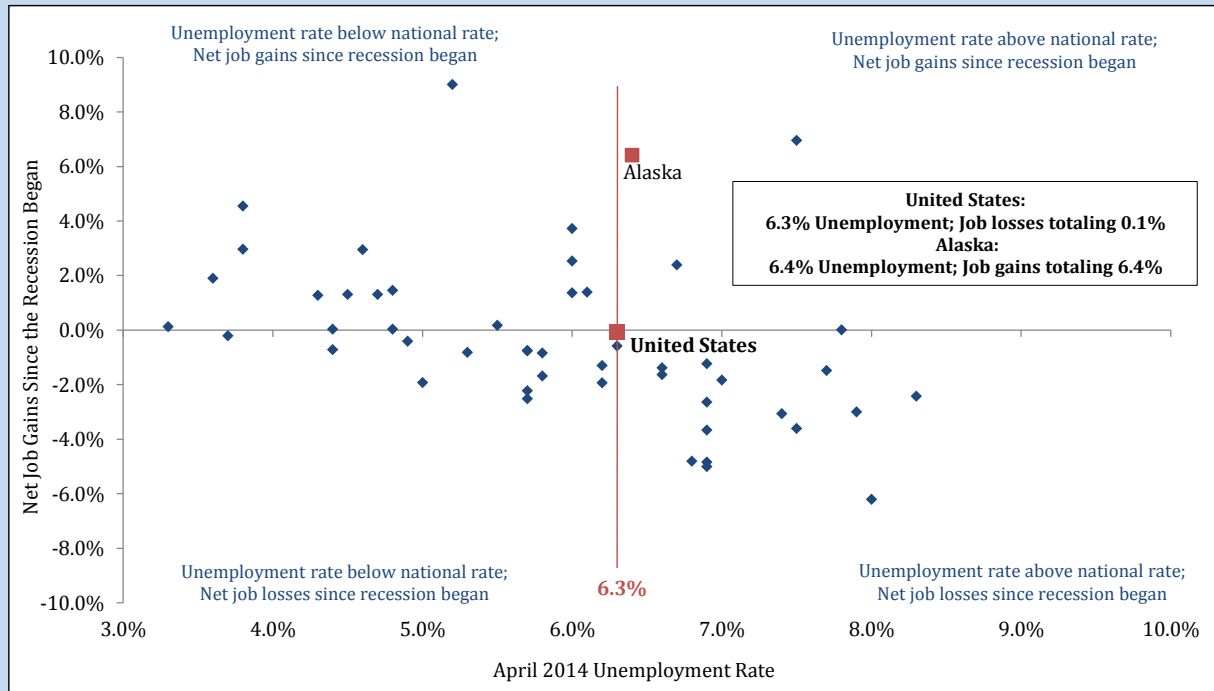

How Does Alaska Compare to Other States?

Workers across the country were hit hard during the recent recession. Since then, employment in some states has returned to pre-recession levels, while employment in other states remains below pre-recession levels. The chart below allows for a comparison of Alaska to other states using two metrics.

The unemployment rate (measured along the horizontal axis) serves as a gauge of current labor-market conditions in Alaska, while net job gains since the recession began (current nonfarm jobs as a share of jobs prior to the recession) measures progress toward labor-market recovery (vertical axis).

States falling in the upper left quadrant have net job gains since the start of the recession and unemployment rates lower than the national unemployment rate. States falling in the lower right quadrant have higher unemployment rates than the United States overall and are still experiencing net job losses relative to pre-recession levels.



Note: The figure above excludes North Dakota, which has a current unemployment rate of 2.6% and net job gains totaling 27.3% since the start of the recession.
