

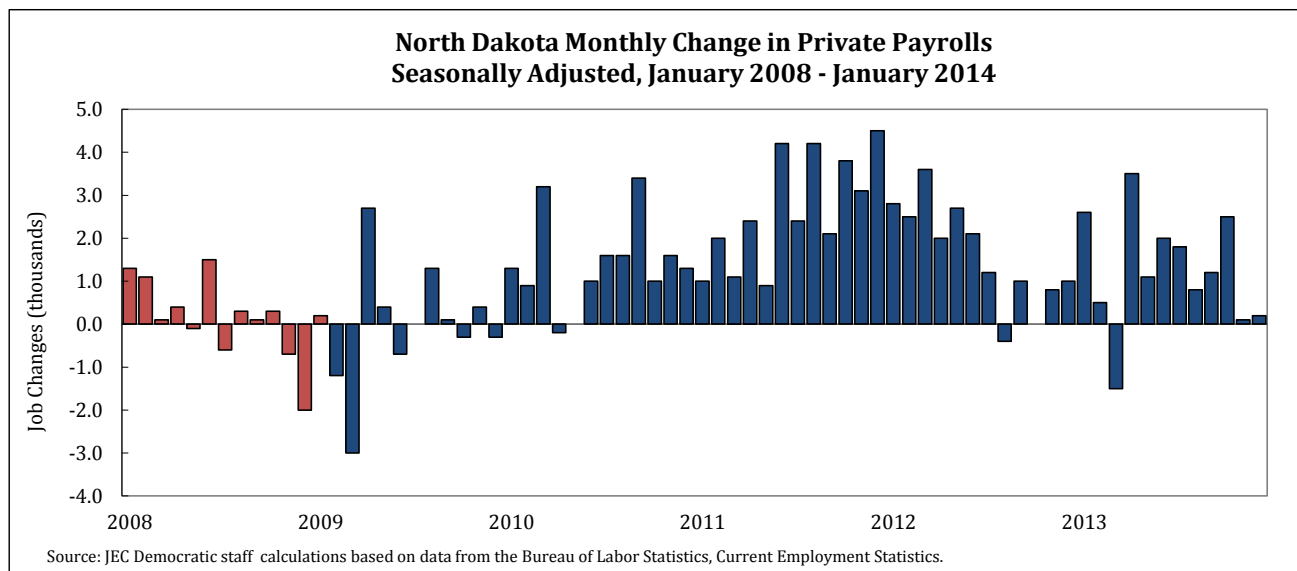


ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: NORTH DAKOTA

Includes Bureau of Labor Statistics jobs and unemployment data through January 2014

JOBS

- In January, private-sector employment in North Dakota grew by 200 jobs. Over the past year, the North Dakota private sector has added 14,800 jobs. This compares with an increase of 19,300 jobs over the 12 months ending in January 2013.
- North Dakota private-sector employers have added 81,200 jobs (an increase of 28.0 percent) since February 2010, the national low point for private-sector employment.
- In North Dakota, the following sectors have posted the largest job gains since February 2010: trade, transportation and utilities (26,000 jobs), mining and logging (20,300 jobs) and construction (11,000 jobs).
- The North Dakota sectors with the greatest job gains in percentage terms since February 2010 are: mining and logging (238.8 percent), construction (51.6 percent) and trade, transportation and utilities (33.0 percent).



UNEMPLOYMENT

- The unemployment rate in North Dakota was 2.6 percent in January 2014, down 0.1 percentage point from December. The rate is down 0.4 percentage point from one year earlier and is below its recent peak of 4.2 percent in May 2009.
- 10,600 North Dakota residents were unemployed during January 2014, down from a recent high of 15,700 in April 2009. There are now 600 fewer people unemployed in North Dakota than when the recession began.
- In North Dakota, initial claims for unemployment insurance benefits totaled 2,168 during January, down 20.4 percent from the previous month. Total initial claims over the past 12 months are down 1.0 percent from their level over the 12 months before that.

EXPORTS

- In North Dakota, exports totaled \$286 million in January and \$3.7 billion over the past year, down 13.6 percent from the 12 months ending in January 2013 (inflation-adjusted dollars).
- North Dakota exports over the past 12 months are up 49.9 percent from their level in the same 12-month period four years earlier (inflation-adjusted dollars).

HOUSING

- Home prices in North Dakota increased by 11.4 percent from the fourth quarter of 2012 to the fourth quarter of 2013 (the most recent quarter for which data are available). North Dakota home prices generally rose throughout the recession and recovery, and they are now 33.1 percent above their level in the fourth quarter of 2007.
- Housing starts in North Dakota totaled 730 units (seasonally adjusted annual rate) in January 2014, a decrease of 82.9 percent from December.
- Within the Midwest census region, which includes North Dakota, sales of new single-family homes totaled 48,000 units in January 2014, a decrease of 17.2 percent from December 2013. Sales of existing single-family homes decreased by 6.7 percent to 970,000 units (at seasonally adjusted annual rates) from December 2013 to January 2014.

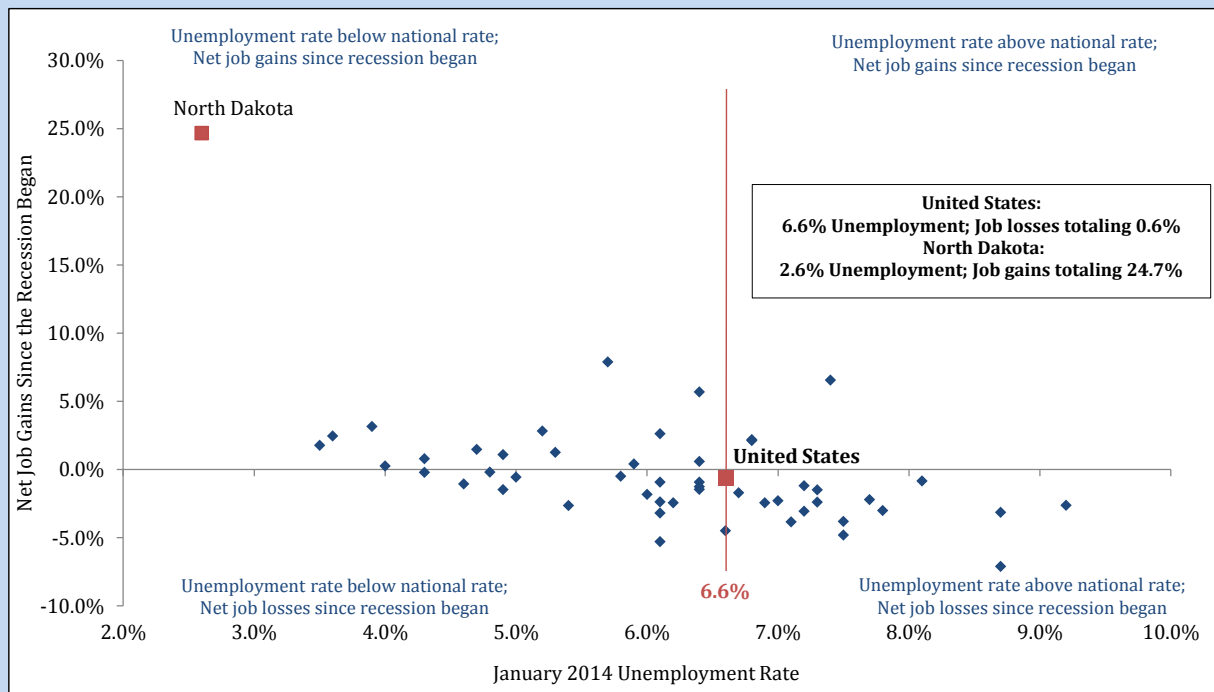

How Does North Dakota Compare to Other States?

Workers across the country were hit hard during the recent recession. Since then, employment in some states has returned to pre-recession levels, while employment in other states remains below pre-recession levels. The chart below allows for a comparison of North Dakota to other states using two metrics.

The unemployment rate (measured along the horizontal axis) serves as a gauge of current labor-market conditions in North Dakota, while net job gains since the recession began (current nonfarm jobs as a share of jobs prior to the recession) measures progress toward labor-market recovery (vertical axis).

States falling in the upper left quadrant have net job gains since the start of the recession and unemployment rates lower than the national unemployment rate. States falling in the lower right quadrant have higher unemployment rates than the United States overall and are still experiencing net job losses relative to pre-recession levels.
