

State Inflation Comparison: Household Inflation Slowed by More Than 40 Percent Under Trump

The Joint Economic Committee (JEC) finds that rising prices increased household costs substantially less during the first 20 months of President Trump’s second term than during the first 20 months of the Biden Administration. The difference amounts to \$2,881 for the average American household.

This analysis compares household cost increases over equivalent 20-month periods under the Biden and Trump administrations. Estimates for the Trump Administration are as reported by Democrats, which based its calculations on the [methodology](#) developed by the JEC to estimate state-level inflation during the Biden Administration. The Biden-era estimates presented here are based on that original methodology, providing a consistent framework for comparing the two periods.

Household cost increases slowed under Trump

During the first 20 months of the Biden Administration, rising prices resulted in \$7,081 in additional costs for the average American household. Over the same period under President Trump, household cost increases were 40.7 percent lower, amounting to \$2,881 less in additional household costs for the average family. As shown in the table below, the slowdown in household cost increases varied by state.

Note: Inflation costs represent the cumulative increase in household expenses relative to January 2021 and January 2025, respectively, over equivalent 20-month periods. The JEC Democrats based its estimates on the methodology developed for the JEC's State Inflation Tracker, published April 2022. While the analyses use the same general methodological framework, differences may remain in the underlying estimates. The JEC Democrats have not published sufficient methodological details to fully reconcile these differences, particularly the allocation of state-level household consumption weights.
