



Louisiana Economic Update

June 19, 2015

Summary


Nonfarm payroll employment in Louisiana increased by 3,900 jobs and the unemployment rate was unchanged at 6.6 percent in May according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Louisiana Unemployment Rate

During May, the unemployment rate in Louisiana was unchanged at 6.6 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed fell by 12 in May to 145,744, while the labor force grew by 4,435 to 2,215,112. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 44 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than Louisiana. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in Louisiana stood at 5.9 percent.

The 10 year peak for the unemployment rate in Louisiana was 9.5 percent in October 2005. The series high for the unemployment rate in Louisiana occurred in November 1986 when the unemployment rate reached 13.1 percent. The 10 year low for the unemployment rate was 3.9 percent in October 2007. This also represents the series low for the unemployment rate in Louisiana. BLS began publishing the state unemployment rate series in 1976.

The national unemployment rate was inched up to 5.5 percent in May. May's unemployment rate was 0.8 percentage point lower than a year earlier when the rate stood at 6.3 percent. The ten year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The ten year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



Louisiana Payroll Employment



Louisiana nonfarm payrolls increased by 3,900 jobs, or 0.20 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during May. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls increased by 3,500. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in Louisiana increased by 11,800, or 0.60 percent. Louisiana nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 9 of the past 12 months.

Nationally nonfarm payrolls increased by 280,000 jobs in May, or 0.20 percent. Over the 12 month period ending in May 2015, nonfarm payrolls grew by 3,058,000 jobs, or 2.21 percent. Louisiana ranks 47th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, Louisiana private sector payrolls increased by 5,000, or 0.30 percent. Private sector payrolls increased by 3,800 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private sector payrolls in Louisiana increased by 17,700, or 1.07 percent. Louisiana private sector payroll employment has increased in 9 of the past 12 months.

Nationally, private sector payroll jobs increased by 262,000 in May, or 0.22 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,958,000 private sector payroll jobs, an increase of 2.53 percent. Louisiana ranks 42nd among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During May, total government payroll employment in Louisiana declined by 1,100, or 0.34 percent. Federal government payroll employment declined by 300, or 0.99 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 900, or 1.06 percent, while local government payroll employment increased by 100, or 0.05 percent.



Over the past year, total government payroll employment declined by 5,900, or 1.79 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 4,800, or 5.39 percent. Local government payroll employment declined by 1,000, or 0.48 percent.

The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during May were Educational & Health Services (+2,200) and Manufacturing (+2,100). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Construction (-2,400) and Total Government (-1,100).

The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Educational & Health Services (+7,600) and Trade, Transportation & Utilities (+5,700). The poorest performing sectors for the year were Total Government (-5,900) and Mining & Logging (-5,800).



Other Louisiana Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in Louisiana was unchanged at 62.0 percent in May. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 33 have a higher labor force participation rate than Louisiana. The labor force participation rate in Louisiana is unchanged from a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

The 10 year high for the labor force participation rate in Louisiana was 66.5 percent in September 2005. This also represents the series high for the labor force participation rate in Louisiana. The 10 year low for the labor force participation rate was 59.3 percent in October 2012. The series low for the labor force participation rate occurred in December 1976 when the labor force participation rate hit 56.3 percent.


The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 62.9 percent in May. That rate is 0.1 percentage point higher than a year earlier.

The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the Louisiana civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, rose to 58.0



percent in May from 57.9 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 35 have higher employment-to-population ratios than Louisiana. The employment-to-population ratio in Louisiana is 1.3 percentage points higher than a year earlier.

The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio in Louisiana was 60.3 percent in September 2005. This also represents the series high for the employment-to-population ratio in Louisiana. The 10 year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 54.9 percent in February 2012. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in March 1977 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 52.4 percent.



The national employment-to-population ratio ticked up to 59.4 percent in May. At 59.4 percent, the national employment-to-population ratio has finally risen back to the level it was at when the recession ended in June 2009. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 percent in May 2000. The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for May is scheduled for release on Tuesday, July 21. The national employment situation report for June is scheduled for release on Thursday, July 2. The national employment report is being released on Thursday instead of Friday due to the Independence Day holiday.
