



# New York Economic Update

October 20, 2015

## Summary

Nonfarm payroll employment in New York increased by 12,000 jobs and the unemployment rate fell to 5.1 percent in September according to data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

## New York Unemployment Rate

During September, the unemployment rate in New York declined by 0.1 percentage point to 5.1 percent. The number of people counted as unemployed fell by 15,592 in September to 486,132, while the labor force fell by 10,989 to 9,617,489. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 25 posted lower unemployment rates for the month than New York. A year earlier, the unemployment rate in New York stood at 6.0 percent.

The 10 year peak for the unemployment rate in New York was 8.9 percent in December 2009. The series high for the unemployment rate in New York occurred in January 1976 when the unemployment rate reached 10.4 percent. The 10 year low for the unemployment rate in New York was 4.3 percent in February 2007. The series low for the unemployment rate in New York occurred in May 1988 when the unemployment rate reached 4.0 percent. BLS began publishing the state unemployment rate series in 1976.

The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.1 percent in September. September's unemployment rate was 0.8 percentage point lower than a year earlier. The ten year high for the national unemployment rate was 10.0 percent in October 2009. The ten year low was 4.4 percent in May 2007.



## New York Payroll Employment



New York nonfarm payrolls increased by 12,000 jobs, or 0.13 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during September. In the prior month, nonfarm payrolls declined by 13,700. Over the past 12 months nonfarm payrolls in New York increased by 127,300, or 1.39 percent. New York nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 9 of the past 12 months.

Nationally nonfarm payrolls increased by 142,000 jobs in September, or 0.10 percent. Over the 12 month period ending in September 2015 nonfarm payrolls grew by 2,752,000 jobs, or 1.97 percent. New York ranks 27th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During September, New York private sector payrolls increased by 11,400, or 0.15 percent. Private sector payrolls declined by 16,000 jobs in the prior month. Over the past 12 months, private sector payrolls in New York increased by 126,100, or 1.64 percent. New York private sector payroll employment has increased in 9 of the past 12 months.

Nationally private-sector payroll jobs increased by 118,000 jobs in September, or 0.10 percent. Over the past 12 months, the nation's economy has added 2,603,000 jobs in the private sector, an increase of 2.21 percent. New York ranks 29th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.

During September, total government payroll employment in New York increased by 600, or 0.04 percent. Federal government payroll employment declined by 500, or 0.43 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 200, or 0.08 percent, while local government payroll employment increased by 1,300, or 0.12 percent.



Over the past year, total government payroll employment increased by 1,200, or 0.08 percent. State government payroll employment declined by 900, or 0.36 percent. Local government payroll employment increased by 900, or 0.08 percent.

The best performing sectors on a seasonally adjusted basis during September were Leisure & Hospitality (+11,200) and Educational & Health Services (+7,200). The poorest performing sectors during the month were Other Services (-5,200) and Financial Activities (-3,800).

The best performing sectors during the last twelve months were Educational & Health Services (+61,300) and Professional & Business Services (+27,500). The poorest performing sectors for the year were Financial Activities (-4,200) and Manufacturing (-3,200).

#### Other New York Labor Force Statistics

The labor force participation rate in New York declined to 60.6 percent in September from 60.7 percent the prior month. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 37 have a higher labor force participation rate than New York. The labor force participation rate in New York is unchanged from a year earlier. The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

The 10 year high for the labor force participation rate in New York was 63.2 percent in December 2008. The series high for the labor force participation rate in New York occurred in December 1989 when the labor force participation rate hit 63.6 percent. The 10 year low for the labor force participation rate was 60.3 percent in December 2014. The series low for the labor force participation rate occurred in December 1976 when the labor force participation rate hit 57.9 percent.

The national labor force participation rate declined by 0.2 percentage point to 62.4 percent in September. That rate was 0.3 percentage point lower than a year earlier. At 62.4 percent, the labor force participation rate is at its lowest level since September 1977.



The employment-to-population ratio, or the percentage of the New York civilian noninstitutionalized population 16 years and older counted as employed, was unchanged at 57.5 percent in September. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, 35 have higher employment-to-population ratios than New York. The employment-to-population ratio in New York is 0.6 percentage point higher than a year earlier.

The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio in New York was 60.1 percent in December 2006. The series high for the employment-to-population ratio in New York occurred in December 1989 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 60.3 percent. The 10 year low for the employment-to-population ratio was 56.3 percent in September 2011. The series low for the employment-to-population ratio occurred in January 1977 when the employment-to-population ratio hit 52.1 percent.

The national employment-to-population ratio declined by 0.2 percentage point to 59.2 percent in September. That rate was 0.2 percentage point higher than a year earlier. The employment-to-population ratio stood at 59.4 percent when the recession ended in June 2009 and at 62.7 percent when it began in December 2007. The all-time high for the employment-to-population ratio was 64.7 percent in April 2000. The 10 year high for the employment-to-population ratio was 63.4 percent in December 2006. The recent low occurred in October 2013 when the employment-to-population ratio dipped to 58.2 percent. The last time the employment-to-population posted a reading lower than 58.2 percent was July 1983.

State employment and unemployment data for October is scheduled for release on Friday, November 20. The national employment situation report for October will be released on Friday, November 6.
