

State-by-State Inflation Data: Families Spending \$700 More Due to Inflation Under Trump

New calculations from the Joint Economic Committee – Minority estimate how much more an average family in every state has to spend to afford the same items each month. This analysis was completed using the most recent Consumer Price Index data on prices in different parts of the country and uses the same methods that the Joint Economic Committee – Republicans used under the last administration to estimate state-level costs.

So far in 2025, the average family has paid more than \$700 in higher costs because of the inflation that has occurred since President Trump took office in January. Families are now paying higher prices despite Trump's claims <u>last year</u> that "inflation will be in FULL RETREAT" by August 2025 and that he <u>would</u> "bring the cost of everything way down". Instead, families in every state are paying more this year amid the President's reckless tariffs and broken promises to lower prices.
