#### **Quote of the week**

#### What you need to know

- It's jobs day. Nonfarm payroll employment grew 266,000 in November (including around 40,000 GM employees returning to work after the strike), and the unemployment rate was 3.5 percent. Average hourly earnings increased 3.1 percent from this time last year.
- A new industry report finds that Trump's 2018 tariffs on solar imports have <u>cost over 62,000</u> <u>jobs and almost \$19 billion in new private sector investment</u>.
- Corporate debt is nearing a record \$10 trillion in the United States. A JEC issue brief, *The Risk of Rising Corporate Debt*, finds that this could worsen a future recession as companies default on their debts.
- The Trump administration approved a rule that allows states to impose work requirements on those who use the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, or food stamps). The change, which was announced just in time for the holidays, is expected to remove nearly 700,000 people from the SNAP program.

#### Happening the week of December 9, 2019

- Tuesday: NFIB releases the November Small Business Optimism Index.
- *Tuesday-Wednesday:* The Federal Reserve Open Market Committee meets to discuss the state of the economy and to decide whether to lower or raise interest rates.
- Wednesday: Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell announces the <u>FOMC's decision on interest rates</u> at 2 p.m. BLS releases the <u>Consumer Price Index</u> and <u>Real Earnings Data</u>.
- *Thursday:* BLS releases the <u>Producer Price Index</u>.
- Friday: Census releases advance estimates of U.S. retail sales for November.


#### Chart of the week

Low-income workers are the least likely to receive paid family leave, but they are the ones who would benefit from it the most.

Women who use paid leave are more likely to return to their employers and maintain their pre-leave wages, which can boost their household income years down the line. Research in New Jersey found that women who took paid leave worked 15 to 20 percent more hours during the second year of their child's life than those who did not, and that their hourly wages increased 5 percent.

#### New research and reports

- A Brookings <u>report on the low-wage workforce</u> studies the 44 percent of workers in low-wage jobs and recommends policies that improve worker skills and address discrimination and bias.
- The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities found that the administration's lawsuit to dismantle
  the ACA, if successful, would reduce taxes for the richest Americans while ending coverage for
  millions of Americans.
- The Brookings Institution found that the <u>administration's new rule also would weaken SNAP's ability to act as an automatic stabilizer</u> during recessions.
