What you need to know

- Over <u>4 million Americans filed for unemployment insurance</u> (UI) during the week ending 4/18, meaning that more than 24 million Americans have lost their jobs in just 5 weeks (not seasonally adjusted). UI benefits are often slow to arrive—as of Thursday, <u>only 117,000 Florida claimants</u> had been paid out of the nearly 1.8 million who had submitted claims.
- 9.2 million workers likely lost their employer-provided health insurance between 3/21 and 4/11.
- Despite a handful of outspoken protests to open the economy, <u>78% of Americans say that state</u> stay-at-home orders are the right decision and 86% are trying to stay home as much as possible.
- On Monday, <u>the price of the main U.S. oil benchmark fell below zero</u>, signaling there is no place to store all the crude oil the world is producing but not using amid the pandemic-induced collapse in demand.
- As the House and Senate voted on legislation to add \$310 billion to the Paycheck Protection Program this week, <u>Secretary Mnuchin warned that there would be "severe consequences"</u> for large companies that take advantage of PPP loans targeted to small firms.

Happening the week of April 27, 2020

- *Tuesday:* The Census Bureau releases <u>advance economic indicators</u> for March. The Conference Board updates its <u>Consumer Confidence Index</u> for April.
- Tuesday-Wednesday: The FOMC is scheduled to have its April meeting.
- *Wednesday*: The BEA releases <u>first quarter GDP</u>. The National Association of Realtors releases its <u>March Pending Home Sales Index</u>. The FOMC is scheduled to release the conclusions from its meeting and Chair Jerome Powell is scheduled to hold a <u>press conference</u>.
- *Thursday:* The Department of Labor releases <u>weekly jobless claims</u>. BEA releases <u>personal</u> income and consumer spending data for March, as well as the <u>PCE index</u>.
- *Friday:* ISM releases its April <u>manufacturing index</u> and the Census Bureau releases <u>March</u> <u>Construction Spending</u>. Automakers release April motor vehicle sales.

Chart of the week:

Black Americans are far overrepresented among those infected by the coronavirus in most reports where racial data is available. While comprehensive national data are largely unavailable, a widely cited CDC study across 14 states shows that 33% of those hospitalized were Black, despite making up just 18% of that study's population.

State data reveal that Blacks living in Southern states have been particularly hard-hit; in Mississippi, they make up 56% of cases despite being just 38% of the population; and in South Carolina, they make up 41% of cases, despite being just 26% of the population.
