

United States Employment Snapshot

- In August, among the 50 states and the District of Columbia unemployment fell in 13, rose in 12, and remained unchanged in 26.
- The highest unemployment rate was 6 percent in **District of Columbia**, and the lowest was 1.9 percent in **South Dakota**. Nationally, the unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 4.3 percent.
- In August, **payroll jobs rose in 32 states and fell in 18.** The largest payroll job percent increase was 0.5 percent in **Utah**. The largest payroll job percent decline was 0.7 percent in **District of Columbia**.

Alabama Employment Snapshot


- In August, Alabama added 3,000 net payroll jobs and the unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage point to 2.9 percent. In the prior month, Alabama added 800 net payroll jobs.
- Over the past 12 months, Alabama added 22,000 net payroll jobs and the unemployment rate fell by 0.2 percentage points from 3.1 percent.
- Nationally, nonfarm payrolls **rose by 22,000 in August, or 0 percent**. Alabama **is tied for 18th** in the nation for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.
- In August, **Alabama's private sector added 2,400 net private payroll jobs**, and over the past 12 months it added 17,300 private payroll jobs. In the prior month, Alabama added 400 net private payroll jobs.
- In August, employment in Alabama fell by 1,224, and over the past 12 months it rose by 30,242.
- Alabama's labor force participation rate fell to 57.7 percent in August from 57.9 percent and is tied for 46th in the nation. In the past 12 months, the labor force participation rate has risen by 0.1 percentage points.



Payroll employment



- Alabama added 3,000 net payroll jobs, or 0.1 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during August. In the prior
 month, Alabama added 800 jobs. Alabama nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 10 of the past 12
 months.
- Nationally, nonfarm payrolls **rose by 22,000 in August, or 0 percent**. Alabama is tied for 18th in the nation for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.
- Alabama added 2,400 private sector jobs, or 0.1 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during August. In the
 prior month, Alabama added 400 jobs. Alabama private sector payroll employment has increased in 10 of the
 past 12 months.
- Nationally, private sector payroll jobs **rose by 38,000 jobs in August, or 0 percent.** Alabama is tied for 18th in the nation for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.


From July 2025 to August 2025:

- The best performing sectors were Leisure and Hospitality (+1,500) and State and Local Government (+1,200).
- The worst performing sectors were Manufacturing (-800) and Financial Activities (-600).



From August 2024 to August 2025:

- The best performing sectors were **Private Education and Health Services** (+7,600) and **State and Local Government** (+6,400).
- The worst performing sectors were Financial Activities (-2,100) and Federal Government (-1,700).




Alabama

Labor force

The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.


- The labor force participation rate in Alabama fell to 57.7 percent in August from 57.9 percent in the prior month.
- · Alabama is tied for 46th in the nation.
- The 10-year high for the labor force participation rate in Alabama was 58 percent occurring in June 2025, and the 10-year low was 55.4 percent in April 2020.
- The national labor force participation rate rose by 0.1 percentage points to 62.3 percent in August.
