

United States Employment Snapshot

- In June, among the 50 states and the District of Columbia unemployment fell in 11, rose in 7, and remained unchanged in 33.
- The highest unemployment rate was 5.9 percent in **District of Columbia**, and the lowest was 1.8 percent in **South Dakota**. Nationally, the unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage point to 4.1 percent.
- In June, **payroll jobs rose in 27 states and fell in 24.** The largest payroll job percent increase was 0.9 percent in **Alaska**. The largest payroll job percent decline was 0.5 percent in **Rhode Island**.

Vermont Employment Snapshot

- In June, Vermont added 100 net payroll jobs and the unemployment rate remained unchanged at 2.6 percent. In the prior month, Vermont added 400 net payroll jobs.
- Over the past 12 months, Vermont added 2,800 net payroll jobs and the unemployment rate rose by 0.3
 percentage points from 2.3 percent.
- Nationally, nonfarm payrolls **rose by 147,000 in June, or 0.1 percent**. Vermont **is tied for 23rd** in the nation for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.
- In June, **Vermont's private sector lost 200 net private payroll jobs**, and over the past 12 months it added 2,100 private payroll jobs. In the prior month, Vermont added 400 net private payroll jobs.
- In June, employment in Vermont fell by 434, and over the past 12 months it fell by 2,680.
- Vermont's labor force participation rate fell to 64.9 percent in June from 65 percent and ranks 15th in the nation. In the past 12 months, the labor force participation rate has fallen by 0.4 percentage points.


Change in Nonfarm Payrolls by Sector in Vermont



- Vermont added 100 net payroll jobs, or 0 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during June. In the prior month, Vermont added 400 jobs. Vermont nonfarm payroll employment has increased in 7 of the past 12 months.
- Nationally, nonfarm payrolls **rose by 147,000 in June, or 0.1 percent**. Vermont is tied for 23rd in the nation for percentage gain in nonfarm payroll employment over the past 12 months.
- Vermont lost 200 private sector jobs, or -0.1 percent, on a seasonally adjusted basis during June. In the prior
 month, Vermont added 400 jobs. Vermont private sector payroll employment has increased in 6 of the past 12
 months.
- Nationally, private sector payroll jobs **rose by 74,000 jobs in June, or 0.1 percent.** Vermont is tied for 22nd in the nation for percentage gain in private sector payroll employment over the past 12 months.

From May 2025 to June 2025:

- The best performing sectors were **State and Local Government** (+300) and **Professional and Business Services** (+200).
- The worst performing sectors were Leisure and Hospitality (-300) and Manufacturing (-200).



• The worst performing sectors were Manufacturing (-900) and Construction (-300).





Vermont

Labor force

The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population age 16 and older who are employed or actively looking for work.

- The labor force participation rate in Vermont fell to 64.9 percent in June from 65 percent in the prior month.
- Vermont ranks 15th in the nation.
- The 10-year high for the labor force participation rate in Vermont was **67.3 percent** occurring in May 2017, and the 10-year low was **61.7 percent** in November 2020.
- The national labor force participation rate fell by 0.1 percentage points to 62.3 percent in June.
